Role of Aboriginal Hospital Liaison Officers

The Royal Melbourne Hospital has produced two videos about services to Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander people.	The first video starts with a welcome to country introducing Aboriginal people what to expect when attending the hospital including why they are asked the questions on admission. It also informs them of the presence and role of the hospital Aboriginal advocate in ensuring you are provided with culturally safe care. Well known Australian Aboriginal actors are featured and demonstrate the interactions and physical environment within the hospital. The second video respectfully introduces staff to the issues Aboriginal people face, including how/why staff utilize AHLO also about asking the question about Aboriginal status.
